Message from Takuya Okada, Chairman of ÆON Environmental Foundation

ÆON Environmental Foundation celebrates its 20th anniversary this year. We would like to thank you for generously supporting us since our establishment in 1990. The 20th anniversary of Jusco Co., Ltd., which belongs to ÆON's supermarket chain, fell in the year 1989. This was the year that saw the fall of the Berlin Wall and many great changes in the world.

In order to fulfill our responsibility as a corporation, we sought a new direction based on the recognition that the North-South issue would become an important concern in the 21st century, and from this, we arrived at the key word—'the environment'.

ÆON Environmental Foundation was established in 1990, with the aim of finding solutions to environmental problems. Toward this aim, we have supported the activities of environmental NGOs and have planted trees in both Japan and other Asian countries along with citizen volunteers. The number of trees we have planted around the Great Wall of China will exceed 1 million in April 2010.

Today, the prevention of global warming and conservation of biodiversity are recognized as two challenging issues at the global level. 2010 is the International Year of Biodiversity and the Conference of the Parties (COP10) will be held in Nagoya, Aichi, Japan. The ÆON Environmental Foundation intends to make further contributions to save our beautiful and irreplaceable planet for future generations.

Throughout human history, civilizations—such as the Greeks or Egyptians—flourished in locations that were rich in water and greenery, and so also did they vanish due to the wanton waste of natural resources. We intend to continue planting trees with citizens in our endeavor to solve these two problems, for a better earth 20 years later and for our children who will comprise the future generation.





Our Activities

Since ancient times, humans have employed resources from the natural environment in the course of civilization. As a result, the environment has been affected by human activities. At present, the impacts of human activities are considerable, and environmental problems have been recognized as a major worldwide crisis in addition to poverty and disputes.

ÆON Environmental Foundation was established in 1990, based on a vision involving a quest for peace, respect for humans, and support to regions.

Since its establishment, our foundation has made diverse efforts in planting trees, reusing resources, supporting environmental NGOs, and co-sponsoring international congresses. As mentioned, we, along with citizen volunteers, planted about 1 million trees around the Great Wall of China alone. The number of trees we planted throughout the world will total more than 9 million. In 2009, our foundation and Japan's Ministry of the Environment were the co-sponsors of the 'Japan Awards for Biodiversity'.

In order to sustain our green planet for future generations, ÆON Environmental Foundation will make further efforts toward resolving the problems of biodiversity through our various activities.



We aim to 'plant' projects and keep working toward future challenges through The Midori Prize for Biodiversity.

This prize will be awarded to honour and support the individuals who have made outstanding contributions and have had an impact on future activities for biodiversity.

The relevant activities are required to:

- 1 have actually been conducted;
- 2 have started from a past date and continue to the future; and
- 3 contribute to safeguard the local ecosystem.

Criteria

The activities are required to have made outstanding contributions and have had an impact on future activities for biodiversity. The nominations will be judged based on the following categories.

- (1) International contribution
- 2 Contribution to conservation and sustainable use
- 3 Social contribution
- 4 Long-term viewpoints / Continuity
- (5) Creativity / Originality
- 6 Civic mindedness / Broad viewpoints
- 7 Efficacy / Influence

A New Viewpoint of the Screening

ÆON Environmental Foundation has made a decision to incorporate civic-minded viewpoints into the screening process. This idea is novel, open-minded, and quite different from the screening process of other prizes. The recipients of Japan Awards for Biodiversity 2009 will join the screening as representatives of the citizens.
